13	make the push for placing military and economic sanctions on Saudi

The Anti-American Association Act

Be it enacted by the Student Congress here assembled that:

SECTION 1. The United States shall take measures to reduce unnecessary aggression committed by members within the Saudi Arabian government.

SECTION 2. A. The International Human Rights Unit of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) shall be authorized to identify violations of human rights and acts of premeditated harm on any United States citizen carried out by any Saudi Arabian government official and fully investigate and prosecute those connected with said human rights violations or acts of premeditated harm on United States citizens. They are further authorized to utilize any and all intergovernmental or international cooperation from any other agencies or nations.

- a. Human rights violations shall be defined as anything in violation of the United Nations' human rights declarations and standards.
- B. The United States Ambassador to the United Nations shall make a motion to the United Nations Security Council to begin a formal investigation in the International Criminal Court into the human rights violations of any member of the Saudi Arabian government suspected of being in violation of human rights.
- a. The United States Acting-Ambassador to the United Nations shall hold the same mandate should the position of United States Ambassador to the United Nations be vacant.
- C. The United States shall freeze any and all property and other assets owned by any Saudi Arabian official in the United States that is criminally connected with the premeditated harm of any United States citizen or of violating the Geneva Convention and any other human rights treaty on any person.
- a. Premeditated harm includes but is not limited to government backed harassment, assault, battery, murder or any other violent action against any non-combatant.
- D. All military aid to Saudi Arabia shall be immediately suspended until such time as sustained evidence over the period of 5 years after the proven elimination of targeted killing of noncombatants occurs by Saudi Arabia.
- E. Funding allocated for military aid spending towards Saudi Arabia and all fossil fuel subsidies shall be reallocated to additional tax credits for green energy and low-interest loans into the development into the improvement and/or expansion of green energy.
- a. Fossil fuel shall be defined as a natural fuel formed by the formed in the geological past from the remains of living organisms.
- b. Green energy shall be defined as methods of generating electricity using the sun, wind, moving water, the earth's heat, and radioactive material.

SECTION 3. A. Section 2A shall be implemented by the Department of Justice

B. Section 2B shall be implemented by the Department of State.

- C. Section 2C shall be implemented by the Department of State and the Department of the Treasury.
- D. Section 2D shall be implemented by the Department of Defense, Department of State and Department of Treasury
- E. Section 2E shall be implemented by the Department of Energy, Department of Treasury, and Department of Defense.
- F. Temporary funding shall be authorized from the overseas contingency operations of the necessary departments/agencies/branches as deemed required by the Congressional Budget Office until the next fiscal year's budget is approved by this congress which includes funding for the departments as appropriated by and for this legislation shall be placed into the budgets of the proper departments.
- SECTION 4. This legislation shall be enacted immediately.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation shall be amended to be in accordance with this legislation.

7	necessary for	the immediate continuance of efficient governance or for the
8	maintenance	of National Security.
9	SECTION 3.	The United States Office of Personnel Management shall
10	oversee the in	nplementation and maintenance of this legislation.
11	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall take effect immediately upon its
12	passage.	
13	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared
14	null and void.	
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A Bill Concerning Universal Draft Registration

Be it enacted by this student congress that:

1	Section 1:	There will be no gender-based restrictions on the requirement for
2		registration with the Selective Service upon turning eighteen
3		years of age.
4	Section 2:	This applies to all individuals ages 18-25 years of age who meet
5		the guidelines for registration currently in place for males.
6	Section 3:	The Selective Service System and the U.S. Citizenship and
7		Immigration Services (USCIS) of the United States Government
8		will oversee the enforcement of this law per the current law. Any
9		penalties for not registering will remain those currently in effect.
10	Section 4:	This bill applies to all born after December 31, 2001.
11	Section 5:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
12		and void.

- 3 WHEREAS, Canada and many European countries adopted a system of screening privatization
- 4 after the 9/11 attacks
- 5 WHEREAS, Travelers in the U.S. experience extremely long wait times for security screenings
- 6 WHEREAS, The TSA has extremely low morale and poor performance among employees
- 7 WHEREAS, The TSA fails to detect weapons, drugs, and explosives 80% of the time
- 8 WHEREAS, The United States has already begun a system of privatization known as the
- 9 Screening Partnership Program, however, only 23 airports utilize this program
- 10 WHEREAS, Private screeners have improved efficiency and perform equally in detecting hazardous materials when compared to the TSA
- 11 WHEREAS, The cost of private screening is lower when compared to the TSA
- 12 **THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** That the Transportation Security Administration is abolished and replaced with a government-contracted security organization in all government 13 operated airports

10. Section 4.	This legislation will go into effect on January 1, 2020.
11. Section 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

Social Media Speech Protection Act

- 1 Section 1: Social Media companies are hereby required to be politically
- 2 neutral in regards to speech on their platforms.
- 3 Section 2: If a social media platform offers monetization options for content, they
- 4 may not discriminate against creators or content based upon their speech
- 5 Section 3: Rules regarding removal from the platform for violating terms of
- 6 service, must be based upon infractions other than political views and
- 7 enforcements of infractions must be applied equally to all users.
- 8 Section 4: If a company removes or demonitizes a content creator unfairly, as to
- 9 infringe upon their freedom of speech they may be sued for damages in Civil
- 10 Court.
- 11 **Section 5:** Content Creators are only responsible for the content on the platform
- and may not be removed for reasons unrelated to their actions upon that
- 13 platform, unless such actions violate US law.
- 14 Section 6: Laws in conflict with this are hereby null and void.
- 15 **Section 7:** This act will go into effect April 1st, 2019 and will be overseen by the
- 16 Federal Communications Commission.

Same Day Voter Registration in PA

- 1. Whereas: Same Day Voter Registration does away with registration deadlines that
- 2. disenfranchise potential voters by placing deadlines 30 days before Election Day.
- 3. Whereas: Same Day Voter Registration also fixes inaccuracies in voter rolls by allowing
- 4. eligible voters to use Same Day Registration to correct outdated voter registration records
- 5. at polling places often due to a name change or change of address.
- 6. Whereas: With Same Day Voter Registration there is far less need for provisional ballot use,
- 7. which will thereby speed the process of recounts and audits, saving taxpayers in the long run,
- 8. and assuring voters that their votes will be counted.
- 9. Whereas: Same Day Voter Registration will increase voter participation as not being registered
- 10. to vote is the biggest impediment to voting. Same Day Registration has been proven to boost
- 11. voter turnout in states that have it; e.g. NH, Colorado, Montana, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Maine.
- 12. Whereas: Same Day Voter Registration is the best stop-gap solution to solve errors in the
- 13. registration process, fix inaccuracies in voter rolls, reduce provisional ballots, and
- 14. increase voter participation.
- 15. THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by this PHSSL Student Congress here assembled:
- 16. That The Pennsylvania legislature should permit Same Day Voter Registration.

The Immigration Reform Act of 2019

	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
1	SECTION 1. The Budget of the U.S. Citizenship And Immigration Services (USCIS)
2	will be increased by Six (6) Billion Dollars.
3	A. This funding will first be taken out of the U.S. Agency for
4	International Development's budget and later redsignated in the first
5	Fisical Year after passage.
6	SECTION 2. USCIS will use this funding to streamline the immigration process,
7	modernize its utilities, review immigration caps, and increase the amount
8	of applications processed.
9	SECTION 3. USCIS will remake and simplify all of its applications.
10	SECTION 4 USCIS will implement, in addition to its other programs, a merit based
11	Green Card application.
12	SECTION 5. This legislation will be implemented on January 1, 2020.
13	SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO NASA'S SPACE EXPLORATION AND OPERATIONS BUDGET TO PRIVATE SPACEFLIGHT COMPANIES

1	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	NASA's space exploration and operations budget, along with the duties
3		associated with that budget, shall be given to private companies in order to
4		increase efficiency
5	SECTION 2.	NASA's space exploration budget funds exploration research, systems
6		development (e.g. Orion and SLS projects), and Commercial Spaceflight.
7		NASA's space operations budget funds the ISS along with Space and
8		Flight Support. Private companies are any spaceflight capable companies
9		(e.g. SpaceX or Blue Horizon).
10	SECTION 3.	NASA shall oversee the transfer of funds. When implemented, 10% of
11		NASA's Space Exploration and Operations budget shall be delegated to
12		private companies. After one year the cost efficiency of the private sector
13		will be compared to that of the public sector by a congressional panel. If
14		the private sector is deemed more cost-efficient twenty percent of NASA's
15		remaining space exploration and operations budget shall be transferred
16		every two years to the private sector.
17		A. The private companies chosen to receive the funding will be decided
18		by NASA
19		B. Any companies chosen by NASA to fulfil its tasks must be approved
20		by Congress.
21	SECTION 4.	This bill shall go into effect January 1, 2020
22	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
