DIRECTOR'S PAGE

Greetings from PHSSL's home office at Susquehanna University. I hope your summer was well and you are back and looking forward to another productive year. Schools are open for the 2015-2016 year and that means it's time to plan for drama, speech, and debate activities.

Here is the first issue of the *Communicator* for 2015-2016. Please read it carefully and keep it for future reference. This particular issue has all materials needed to participate in drama activities for the first semester. *If you have not been involved with the drama events in the past, please consider doing so. It is a lot of fun and reaps many rewards.*

At the July meeting of the Executive Board many actions were adopted that affect PHSSL's operation. A number of them were made in response to feedback that the Board received from members. Let me provide you with "headlines." You can find the details within the Meeting Minutes of this mailing. Changes in the Bylaws or Handbooks are ALWAYS updated on the on-line version and available immediately for your convenience. If you do not have access to the internet, please feel free to request paper copies from the State Office.

- Act 153 has been passed in Pennsylvania requiring anyone in PA working with minors to obtain clearances. This will pertain to coaches and judges who are involved with PHSSL. It is the responsibility of each school/team to be sure their participants have obtained these clearances prior to their involvement at PHSSL events. PHSSL will not separately monitor clearance collection and verification.
- 2. Mr. Hugh Ringer, Mr. Keith Brosious, and Ms. Ellen Boyer were re-elected to the Executive Board. Mrs. Christine Metcalfe was also elected to the Executive Board this year.
- 3. With Michael Nailor's decision to pursue other endeavors, the Board requested that the Tournament Coordinator position be filled by David Long. Mr. Long graciously accepted, and looks forward to starting in this capacity prior to the 2016 State Tournament.
- 4. The Board was able to meet with a representative from Tabroom.com and was pleased with what the program has to offer. A decision was made by the Board to approve the use of Tabroom.com beginning during the 2016 State Tournament. We are all excited to see the improvements that will be made possible with the inclusion of the Tabroom.com software program.
- 5. Larry Augustine announced that he will be retiring as the Executive Director after the 2016 State Tournament. The Board discussed potential replacements for his position, as well as the current agreement between PHSSL and Susquehanna University. Members of the Board will continue talks regarding both of these areas and make a determination regarding the outcome prior to the 2016 State Tournament.
- 6. A number of concerns that were brought to the attention of the Board were addressed during this year's summer meeting. Please be sure to refer to the meeting minutes for updates. (Any change or update affecting speech and debate will be made and updated in the handbooks prior to December 31, 2016. This information is always accessible through the Documents/Forms page on the PHSSL website.)
- 7. Please be sure to forward information to the State Office regarding any PHSSL competition you have scheduled, so we can place it on the Events Calendar.
- 8. Hall of Fame Coordinator: Mr. David Long. Please send your nominations no later than December 1.

As I said earlier, the above reflects PHSSL **"headlines."** The minutes of the meeting detail the actions and discussions about the above, as well as other information for you to be aware of. Pennsylvania High School Speech League Summer Executive Board Meeting July 28, 2015

Attendance: Lisa Bompiani-Smith, Keith Brosious, John Buettler, Barb Giuliano, Nathan Lawver, David Long, Christine Metcalfe, Michael Nailor, Kate O'Halloran, Hugh Ringer, Neil Strine, Beth Young, Larry Augustine & Codie Nevil Sauers. Guest: Chris Palmer (Tabroom.com)

The meeting began at 1:00pm.

Special Business:

 Prior to the start of the board meeting, Chris Palmer, from Tabroom.com, made a presentation for the members of the PHSSL board regarding the main components of the Tabroom.com software program, and how its use may affect the PHSSL State Tournament.

Approval of Minutes:

• After a review of the 2015 March meeting minutes a motion was made by John Buettler to accept the minutes. The motion was seconded by Hugh Ringer, and passed unanimously.

Addition to the General section of the day's agenda:

• The Board will discuss the possible use of Tabroom.com beginning at the 2016 PHSSL Tournament.

Additions for the agenda:

• PHSSL's continued presence at Susquehanna University or to move to another school

Executive Director's Financial Report:

- The dates for the 2015-2016 school year were announced: Drama Festival will be held December 11 & 12, 2015; the PHSSL State Tournament will be held on April 8 & 9, 2016.
- The Profit and Loss balance balanced with a \$5,100.00 increase. The detailed Profit and Loss sheet was reviewed without additional questions.
- The Account Quick Sheet, Balance Sheet and Transaction Sheets were reviewed. The expenditures and income balance. No additional explanations requested.
- A motion was made by Lisa Bompiani-Smith to accept the Financial Report. The motion was seconded by Nathan Lawver, and passed unanimously.

Committee Reports:

• No committee reports to address

Old Business:

• None

New Business:

- The following items were reviewed:
 - o 2015-2016 Brochure (forensics and drama)
 - o Calendar
 - o District Assignments and Drama Coordinators (assignments will be posted in the *Communicator*)
 - o Hall of Fame coordinator selected. (Dave Long will coordinate this for 2016 selection)

General Business:

- 1. Dropping from 4 to 3 preliminary rounds in debate events: Beth Young moved to form a committee to study the numbers of participants and breaks for the last 3 years in all debates to see what it would look like with 3 rounds. The motion was seconded by Keith Brosious and passed unanimously. (Beth Young will chair the committee and Keith Brosious will also serve.)
- 2. State tournament judges and missed judging fines: There was a question as to whether or not they are actually being assessed and collected, and a mention as to possibly splitting the revenue from them with hired judges. With the use of Tabroom.com, judge and coaches will know immediately that the fines are assessed because the system sends out an automated notice. Hired judges are already compensated for their participation.
- 3. Added topic: Motion to accept Tabroom.com. David Long made a motion to accept the use of Tabroom.com. The motion was seconded by Hugh Ringer, and passed unanimously.
 - o Beth Young moved to provide an honorarium to Chris Palmer of \$100.00 for coming to present the Tabroom.com program. Christine Metcalfe seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.
 - The board will wait for Chris Palmer to confirm whether or not he is able to come back for the tournament. A motion was made by Barb Giuliano to invite him to be here from Thursday to Saturday for the State Tournament to help acclimate tournament committee members to the Tabroom.com software program. The motion was seconded by Beth Young, and passed unanimously. (The Board was notified that Chris Palmer is paid through a grant to provide such services, but member's asked that it be put on the March agenda to consider an honorarium to be provided to Chris Palmer at that time as well.)

RADIO:

- 1. Due to Jerry Colapinto's notice about discontinuing the writing of Commentary topics, Nathan Lawver will take over both Commentary and Extemporary topics. For Extemporary, coaches and student will submit topics and Nathan will supervise the process.
 - A date will be added to the PHSSL calendar and an email sent notifying coaches that they (district chairs, coaches, and students) will have until March 15th to submit specific questions for Extemporary and Contemporary chosen topics to Nathan Lawver.
 - 2. No action taken concerning changes due to vocal characteristics.

POETRY:

- A motion was made by Christine Metcalfe to write "and distinguishable" under the Poetry and Prose critique sheets. The motion was seconded by David Long, and passed unanimously.
 Additionally, a motion was made by Beth Young to include the following sentence in Section B10.3 and B11.3 of the Bylaws: "If multiple selections are used, they must be linked and distinguishable."
 The motion was seconded by John Buettler, and passed unanimously.
- 2. Blended poetry: was discussed in the above motion. No further action taken.

SENATE:

- 1. A motion was made by David Long to correct the Senate portion of the District Rules of Procedure to read "For 9-11 entries, the top 2 will advance to States. Entries between 12 and 20 will advance 3 to States." at the beginning of the Plan B paragraph. The motion was seconded by Keith Brosious, and passed unanimously.
- 2. It was suggested that a number of guaranteed speeches would be offered at States: Precedence should be followed by the Parliamentarian. No action taken.

PUBLIC FORUM:

1. A suggestion was offered that there be a requirement for teams who have met previously in the tournament to flip: No action taken.

DI, HI, DUO:

1. A review of the policy on student's copying exact cuttings for use in DI, HI and Duo took place. Section S11 of the Standing Rules addresses exact cutting as Theft. PHSSL participants should already be aware of this and recognize that there are grounds for disqualification, if it occurs during competition. No additional action taken.

POLICY DEBATE:

1. A motion was made by Beth Young "to change the point range on the policy debate ballot from 1-10 per team, and remove the boxes from the debate ballot." The motion was seconded by Keith Brosious, and passed unanimously.

A second motion was made by Lisa Bompiani-Smith to replace the boxes on the ballot with a sentence stating "In assigning points 1-10, you should consider these points: (Analysis, Communication, Evidence, Organization, Reasoning, Refutation)" The motion was seconded by Kate O'Halloran, and passed unanimously.

- 2. Addressed in the above motion.
- 3. A motion was made by Beth Young to remove the paragraphs in the District Rules for all debate events that referred to "Five or fewer teams". The motion was seconded by Nathan Lawver, and passed unanimously.

PARLIAMENTARY DEBATE:

- 1. A. An error was caught in regard to Parliamentary Debate and not addressed during competition. This concern will be resolved with the incorporation of the Tabroom.com software.
- B. A motion was made by Beth Young to review the Parliamentary Debate ballot, and guide submitted by Ben Edwards. A formal proposal will be provided to the Board at a later date by Beth Young and Ben Edwards to address their findings. The motion was seconded by Barbara Giuliano, and passed unanimously.
- 2. Use of Ranks v. Points for tie-breakers, and narrowing the point range: Submitted by Beth Young, will be reviewed at a later time.
 - 3. Potential advantages given to students who have access to technology: No action taken.

Other:

- 1. Upon the Board's request, David Long agreed to serve as the Tournament Coordinator, a position previously completed by Michael Nailor.
- 2. There were multiple ideas offered to address Tab Room needs during the State Tournament and to make the event run more effectively. Some difficulties will be addressed with the incorporation of the Tabroom.com software, and a focus is going to be made to assign duties in an effective manner with attention given to ability and need. It was requested that suggestions be forwarded to the new Tournament Coordinator, David Long, via email.
- 3. A motion was made by Hugh Ringer to offer an Ed Kelly Policy Debate award. The motion was seconded by Keith Brosious, and passed unanimously.

Addenda Items Addressed:

- 1. A motion was made by Beth Young to amend the District Standing Rules: under D12 to remove the sentences "After two rounds of competition, the swing contestant and the contestant with the lowest rank are to be dropped. This allows the remainder of the tournament (Round 3, or Rounds 3 and 4 depending on numbers entered) to continue with an even number of contestants." This set of sentences should be removed from all of the debate categories. The motion was seconded by Nathan Lawver, and passed unanimously.
- 2. Kate O'Halloran made a motion to rank students in preliminary sessions of House and Senate by using averages of speech scores. The motion was seconded by Beth Young, and passed unanimously. Kate O'Halloran will review and update the House and Senate Handbooks.
- 3. All of the concerns in section 3 of the Addenda are addressed through the following changes in the Bylaws:
 - o (p. 31) Remove "Extemp, Commentary, Persuasion, Informative, Impromptu, Student Congress Senate:" and replace it with "All Speech (except Radio Announcing) and Interp events:"
 - o (p. 32) Remove "and Student Congress Senate" from above the first box.
 - (p. 32) Under B. in Final Placement, the sentence should now read "Add to preliminary scores for each school the final placement of ALL competitors in Student Congress House, Senate, and every speech event."
 - 4. Ranking and ballots for Congress: No action taken, addressed previously.
 - 5. A charge for drops in Congress was discussed and drops are charged in all events.
- 6. Kate O'Halloran will submit a correction for the wording mentioned in the 6th section of the Addenda, to the Board, for approval.
 - 7. Being addressed in connection with other listed concerns on Addendum.

Topic Selection:

Parliamentary: "This House believes that governments should provide a guaranteed Universal Basic income." A motion was made by Lisa Bompiani-Smith to accept the above Parliamentary Prepared Topic. The motion was seconded by Kate O'Halloran, and passed unanimously.

A motion was made to accept all topics by Nathan Lawver. The motion was seconded by David Long, and passed unanimously.

ADDITIONAL:

- Act 153: School coaches should know that under Act 153, every coach and volunteer that comes to PHSSL has to have clearances completed. This counts for hired judges as well as coaches, and judges who are brought by teams. There was a mention that individuals who apply for their clearances as volunteers do not pay to have them completed. (The possibility of clearances being free of cost should be verified with the Commonwealth. Information can be found on the Dept. of Human Services site at http://www.dhs.state.pa.us/findaform/childabusehistoryclearanceforms/) We were told that this is already effective throughout the state.
 - ****Each participant school is responsible for the obtaining and verification of clearances for their participants—this will not be monitored separately by PHSSL.***
- A job description will be created by the Executive Director, State Secretary, and Tournament Coordinator describing position duties so that they are on-hand for future PHSSL use.

The meeting adjourned. 5:40pm.

DRAMA HANDBOOK

Article B18 – Drama

Section B18.1

Each school may have one entry in the Regional Drama Festivals. In the case of a single gender school, arrangements may be made with the Regional Drama Coordinator of the event.

Section B18.2

Each region shall qualify two plays to the State Drama Festival. If eight schools participate in any Regional Drama Festival, three plays will advance from that Regional Festival to the State Drama Festival. No more than eight schools shall make up a Regional Festival. If more than 24 schools enter the Regional Festival, a fourth Regional Festival will be created.

Section B18.3

Material used may be a one-act play, a cutting from a longer play, or an original play. Musicals may not be used. The play must have a minimum of three characters. Characters may not be added or cut from published plays that would be in violation of copyright regulations except with written permission by the publisher and/or author. The play which wins first place in the State Tournament may not be used the following year. Each school is responsible for any royalty obligations.

Section B18.4

The playing time shall be not less than 20 minutes nor more than 40 minutes. Each play shall also have up to 10 minutes for setting the stage and up to 5 minutes for striking the stage.

Section B18.5

A total of 40 minutes will be available to each play for technical rehearsal, including setting the stage, and striking the stage. The time may be used at the discretion of each school, but may not exceed 40 minutes total.

Section B18.6

The host school shall supply a basic lighting plot with a minimum of three general lighting areas and one follow spot. It is suggested that participating schools supply a light, sound, and curtain cue sheet. The host school shall supply a simple set adaptable to the needs of the plays. No school should attempt to transport to the festival complete stage settings. All hand properties, make-up, and costumes shall be provided by the school presenting the play.

Section B18.7

Any play that is more than one minute under the minimum or one minute over the maximum in extra playing or technical time is not eligible to receive first place on any individual judge's ballot. This will not affect the selection to the All-State Cast.

Section B18.8

- a. The regional and state judging shall be the ranking system as used in all Pennsylvania High School Speech League events.
- b. In addition to the ranking of the plays at the State Drama Festival, the judges will name an All-State Cast of not less than three or more than ten members.
- c. The judges are to be selected by the Regional Coordinators for regional competition, and by the Executive Director for State competition. A panel of three judges must be used at the Regional competition. Regional judges will be paid \$10.00 per play. A panel of five judges must be used at the State competition.

Section B18.9

The Director of the contest play will not be allowed backstage during setup, performance, and strike. The Director is permitted in the dressing rooms.

Section B18.10

Awards at the State Festival: the top three schools receive plaques (first, second, and third); the remaining schools receive "State Finalist" plaques. Each student selected as a member of the All-State Cast receives a plaque (no fewer than three or more than eight).

Section B18.11

Regional Registration will now be sent to the State Office, and after all registrations are received, individual schools will be assigned to a regional competition. Geographic location and equalization of regional competition will be the prime factors in assigning schools. There will be three regions. No more than eight schools can be assigned to a region. If needed, additional region(s) will be created. The registration fee for the regional drama festival shall not exceed \$50.00.

Section B18.12

All schools participating in Regional Drama will receive 4 points for participation. All schools participating in State Drama will receive 4 points for participation.

Section B18.13

The Drama Handbook shall be considered a part of the Constitution.

FESTIVAL AND CONTEST SUGGESTIONS

The Regional Drama Coordinator will schedule its Drama Festival whenever it is convenient for that particular Region, and at any time prior to the deadline set by the League Office. Each member school is permitted to enter a play in a Regional Festival. Each Region shall qualify two plays to the State Festival. Where possible, area colleges might be willing to help with the Regional Festival in providing facilities and judges. A member of the Executive Board will be appointed as liaison to each of the Regional Drama Festivals.

The following suggestions are given for the Regional Coordinator and host schools in planning for the Regional, and State Festival.

- 1. The Regional Drama Coordinator must be active in secondary school drama and/or knowledgeable in drama.
- 2. All deadline dates for the Regional and State Festivals will be enforced.
- 3. The schedule for the performances of the plays can be by an impartial drawing for position; or the plays may be scheduled to facilitate staging and timing by the Regional Coordinator (Regional) and the Executive Director (State).
- 4. The host school or Coordinator will provide a competent stage crew. The participating school may provide its own trained stage crew, if acceptable with host and the school's regulations.
- 5. The host school shall provide competent light and sound technicians who will receive cues from the competing high school student stage managers.
- 6. The host shall provide a timekeeper and such house personnel as necessary to insure a smooth running performance.
- 7. The Coordinator will be responsible for sending all necessary information and reports to the Executive Director immediately at the close of the event.

It is the responsibility of the Coordinator in charge to secure competent judges. The judging will be by a panel of judges. Regional judges will be paid \$10.00 per play. The following committees can function to arrange for the planning and presentations of Drama events:

<u>Regional Festival</u>: Director of the host school, Regional Coordinator as appointed by the Executive

Director, and Chairperson of the participating districts

State Festival: Executive Director, Executive Committee, and the Regional Directors

NOTE: PHSSL Membership Form MUST be completed and dues paid prior to Drama Festival.

NFHS Policy Debate Topic Selection and Ballot

Synopsis of Problem Areas and Resolutions for 2016-17

PROBLEM AREA I: CHINA

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its economic and/or diplomatic engagement with the People's Republic of China.

Among the possible areas could be: Reforming segments of U.S./China trade; working with China to increase respect for human rights; working with China to better understand and manage its territorial ambitions in the South China Sea and other parts of Asia; how to work with China to best mitigate ongoing concerns over Taiwan; how to work with China to ensure sustainable energy and resource policies; how best to protect indigenous groups within China; how best to handle ongoing concerns over Tibet; how best to work together on the threat posed by world terrorism and many others. Given the amount of literature on the topic, and the number of policy experts opining about China – teams can be assured of finding case ideas in a wide range of areas, with novel and unique Affirmatives being proposed by policy experts almost monthly. The topic's literature base ensures a dynamic range of case options. Negatives will have ample ground to explore the solvency of diplomatic or economic engagement; the effects of changes in China policy on surrounding Asian nations; the implications for U.S. allies in the region should any change to U.S. policy toward China occur and the effect of change on the U.S. in light of its other national interests and obligations. Case specific disadvantages, again, given the literature base, will move beyond the generic, allowing for case advantages to be weighed by countervailing arguments – including arguments pertaining to the crack-down on rights within China; land use arguments, and specific species protection disadvantages; implications for China/Taiwan relations; labor specific disadvantages; and disadvantages dealing with economic issues specific to plan action (inflation, currency collapse, etc., all directly related to case specific action in China. Counterplan and Kritik ground will be fertile with both case specific and generic arguments in play. There will be plenty of case specific debate, given the literature base on the topic and the number of international experts that write on China there will be no shortage of clashing ideas on how best to engage China, giving teams many possibilities to find proposals for action directly counter to the Affirmative's. These clashing ideas would affect debate over specific solvency options and case specific advantages. With China rising in stature on the national stage, the resolution is education, timely, and necessary to debate.

PROBLEM AREA II: TREATIES

Resolved: The United States federal government should ratify or accede to one or more of the following: Convention on the Rights of the Child, Law of the Sea Treaty, Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, Anti-Personnel Mine Ban Convention, Optional Protocol to the Convention against Torture.

America's status as a global advocate for peace, cooperation, and human rights is often put to the test when multilateral treaties are on the table. In particular, the U.S. has been criticized for its failure to ratify several widely-adopted agreements, notably the Law of the Sea Treaty, the Convention on the Rights of the Child, the Ottawa Treaty banning landmines, the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty and the Optional Protocol to the Convention against Torture. Affirmatives on this topic could advocate unconditional ratification of any of the listed treaties, or could alternatively advocate ratification with reservations excepting individual provisions. Cases could leverage not only the advantages specific to each treaty, but also critical and policy-based objections to American exceptionalism and unilateral action. The list of five treaties allows negatives to develop deep case arguments against each treaty. Counterplan options could include alternate actors and solvency mechanisms as well as reservations against particular provisions of the treaty. There is rich disadvantage ground in the areas of international relations, economic and political leadership, environmental impacts and human rights. Critical positions arise from issues of American exceptionalism, exporting capitalist values and the implications of gender and child issues.

PROBLEM AREA III: INDIA

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its economic engagement with the Republic of India.

Economic engagement between the United States and the Republic of India, is a topic that frequently dominates discussion among political leaders in both nations. At the same time, U.S. trade policy is an issue that often occupies rhetoric of both major U.S. political parties. Multiple aspects of economic relations with India provide ground for affirmative advocacy of change in present policy. Affirmative case areas include: removal of barriers that restrict trade, promotion of India's agriculture industry, increased space exploration cooperation, increased emphasis on technology transfer, and poverty relief assistance. Negative teams have the option of relying on economic claims related to trade issues, problems associated with dual-use technology, arguments related to other nations, such as Pakistan and China as targets for increased economic engagement. Solvency claims for negative can be based on arguments related to cooperation of business organizations, political division in India, and U.S. opposition based on economic concerns such as domestic unemployment. Disadvantages include political scenarios based on how implementation would affect U.S. election outcomes, domestic U.S. backlash, hegemony arguments with particular emphasis on China and Russia, adverse reaction by Pakistan's leaders, and environmental impacts associated with increased economic growth in India. Finally, the presence of humanitarian and gender equality issues currently occurring in the Republic of India provide ground for a host of critical arguments. Negative teams opting to challenge the resolution on critical grounds can claim that increased U.S./India economic engagement will exacerbate gender equity problems in India, result in increased cultural imperialism, and cause cultural appropriation in the United States.

PROBLEM AREA IV: EXPORT CONTROLS

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially strengthen its export controls on dual-use technology toward one or more of the following: China, Israel, Russia, Taiwan.

In an era where both domestic and international technology transfers are becoming necessary for a variety of reasons many continue to inquire if current export controls are adequate to protect U.S. technology from misuse by foreign powers. The U.S. faces many challenges in export control policy including threats from nations who illegally acquire technology. A fair division of ground exists in the literature base between those who want to prioritize security concerns and protect technology, and those who want to reduce export controls to stimulate growth in the technology sector. With this divide in mind, the topic offers debaters the opportunity to investigate a unique foreign policy tool, which has been only debated in small areas of past topics such as Russia, China, or arms sales. Affirmatives would have opportunities to investigate the role U.S. technology exports play in international terrorism, proliferation, security, and human rights issues. For example, they could strengthen controls on computers and microprocessors to China or Taiwan to prevent missile proliferation; stop all current or future transfers of policing technology to Israel, or eliminate transfers of microprocessors and database technology to Russia. Negatives would have the ability to highlight the impacts of export controls on trade, international relations, and domestic technological competitiveness. For example, negative teams would have ample ground to argue relations disadvantages to each of the countries listed in the topic, or negatives could argue business confidence disadvantages. Negatives would have access to counterplans on alternate export control mechanisms like sanctions or quid-pro-quo. Solvency debates will also be diverse on both the type of technologies and the types of controls.

PROBLEM AREA V: ASIAN PACIFIC RIM

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its economic engagement with the Association of Southeast Asian Nations.

Southeast Asia represents a new and well-balanced topic area. The ten nations of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations, or ASEAN: Brunei Darussalam, Burma (Myanmar), Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam. These nations constitute a growing and vital region of the world. If the member nations were considered a single economy, ASEAN would be the world's seventh largest economy. Though ten very different countries, the member nations are joined by a commitment to consensus building. Since President Obama announced in 2010 that the United States would shift its foreign policy to focus more on Asia-Pacific, now known as the "Asia Pivot," this area has received more interest. The topic focuses on the United States increasing its economic engagement to this vital region, and for good reason. ASEAN neighbors to China, India, Japan, and South Korea, and one third of the world's maritime trade passes through the Straits of Malacca and the South China Sea. In addition, there are several important issues facing the region, including: sustained economic growth, territorial rights, and environmental and human impacts of development. Affirmative cases could focus on building a free-trade agreement with ASEAN, response to maritime piracy, climate adaptation, development assistance, infrastructure investment, increase financial integration, and telecommunications and cybersecurity support. Negative positions would include a the cost and impact of free-trade agreements between the U.S. and other countries, discussion of the U.S.'s role of the region, discussion of China's role in the region, other forms of engagement with ASEAN such as cultural or military, territorial tensions, human trafficking, the effects of development on the environment, and the impact of globalization and development on human rights in the region.
