STATE TOURNAMENT

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

1. **REGISTER** by March 1, 2018, at www.tabroom.com. The TABROOM site will be available to accept registrations starting on January 15, 2018.
2. NO PAPER REGISTRATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED.
3. For each student in Informative and Persuasive speech events: you must send a copy of the speech, bibliography and cover sheet signed by the student and the coach declaring this to be an original speech to the State Office by March 14, 2018 (jfettero@bloomu.edu) Registration for Speech events is not complete until these are emailed. See B7.6 and B8.6.
4. **FINANCES:** Please calculate your registration fees from the TABROOM fee page. Fees can be paid up front by mailing to the State Office or Paid in person on the day of the tournament at Check – in.
5. A late fee of \$50.00 will be assessed to any tournament registrants that register after 4 p.m. on Tuesday, March 13, 2018.
6. A nuisance fee of \$50.00 will be assessed per entry dropped after 4:00 PM the Tuesday prior to the State Tournament (March 14, 2018). No charge for name changes in Impromptu, News Casting and Student Congress.
7. **BE CERTAIN THAT YOUR CERTIFICATE OF INSURANCE IS ON FILE AT THE STATE OFFICE.** Check the PHSSL.org website's homepage. Click the link for membership and insurance status.
8. You must enter your Impromptu, News Casting, and Student Congress: House student when you register on the *Tabroom* web site.
(You cannot enter a Student Congress: House student if you have not sent a bill/resolution to Jodi at jfettero@bloomu.edu by January 31.)

DIRECTOR'S PAGE

Here is the second PHSSL newsletter for 2017-2018. Most of the information in it deals with the District and State tournaments. **Do** pay attention to the established deadlines (all reported earlier in the first newsletter of this year-- and again repeated in this edition of the newsletter). All District Chairpersons should let me know how many pins and certificates are needed for their District Tournaments, and I'll see you get them. **Remember: Membership dues to the State Office are due no later than February 1. If dues are not in by the February 1 date you may NOT participate in Districts.** PHSSL will be supplying each District with a Sweepstakes award to be presented to the Most Outstanding School. Since District points are not considered in the tabulation of state awards, the creation of this District Sweepstakes Award was established. We are asking each District Chair to review the Checklist at the end of the District Bylaws section of the Binder. Also, the District Chairs are to announce the State Tournament qualifying students at their tournament so the students and schools know they are eligible to attend the State Tournament and can submit their registration form in a timely manner. **Remember: March 1 is the deadline for schools to register for the State Tournament.** No paper registrations will be accepted, **you must register through www.tabroom.com.** See **CALENDAR**.

Let me remind everyone that the Executive Board will be holding its semi-annual spring meeting at Bloomsburg University on Thursday, March 15. If you have any matter to be brought to the Board's attention, please communicate with your Board representative or let me know about the matter so it can be placed on the meeting's agenda. This particular Board meeting mainly discusses State Tournament concerns, and other matters are postponed until the July meeting.

I hope that all the tournaments, local and District, held in the next number of weeks turn out to be excellent ones! Again, thank you for all the extra and time-consuming work you put into forensics. The students and schools do really appreciate it! Hope to see you at the State Tournament in the spring.

- **Informative and Persuasive Speaking: "Prior to each PHSSL tournament the student must send a copy of the speech, a bibliography, and a cover sheet signed by the student and coach declaring the speech to be original." See B7.6 & B8.6. See Tournament Registration information page above.**
- **Register for State Tournament through www.tabroom.com ONLY. No paper copy will be accepted by the State Office.**
- **A page has been added to the website so schools can check the status of their membership and insurance requirement to participate in PHSSL events. If you are advancing to the State Tournament, please be sure that your insurance liability certificate has been provided to the state office prior to the tournament date.**
- **Congress bills will be made available on the PHSSL website by March 1st. If you are participating in either the Senate or House events, please see the PHSSL website for Student Congress assignments and legislation pieces.**

These individuals are YOUR elected representatives and want to present and address your ideas and needs in handling the business of PHSSL's programs, activities, and policies. NEW CHANGES FOR 2017-2018

E-Balloting

This year, PHSSL is going to follow the lead of many leading local, state, and national forensics organizations and utilize a feature of Tabroom called E-Balloting for debate only. The reasons for the shift include increased speed and flexibility of ballot completion and entry, the clarity of typed feedback for competitors, and the philosophy of PHSSL that it is vital to the educational process of forensics to encourage digital literacy. One major benefit will be for judges who feel pressured by the time necessary to complete a ballot quickly and turn it in, as comments can be added at any time, even after a decision and points have been submitted to Tabroom. Therefore rounds can be scheduled more quickly and students can receive more effective feedback from more relaxed judges.

A comprehensive tutorial will be available in the Communicator and on the PHSSL website that includes detailed graphical walkthroughs on how to set up a Tabroom account, receive alerts for rounds, entering ballot comments and decisions, and submitting ballots to Tabroom.

Obviously, internet access is crucial to the success of online balloting. Bloomsburg will provide free high-speed WiFi throughout the tournament, but judges will have to bring their own devices that can connect to WiFi. That includes laptop computers, tablets, and smart phones. In case of technological failure or lack of available devices, traditional paper ballots will be available.

New SWEEPSTAKES Information

Located in the Bylaws

Section B20.7 Brother Rene Sterner Sweepstakes Award

Each year the rotating Brother Rene Sterner Sweepstakes Award shall be presented to the outstanding school on the basis of having accumulated the most points in state competition in a given year on the following point system:

1. For all of the qualifying categories, use the number of entries to determine the number of points earned by the first place winner, and then award all competitors points in reverse order from there. (Thirty entries means 30 points to 1st place, 29 point to 2nd place, 28 points to 3rd place, etc.)
2. For the three supplemental events, competitors receive half of the entries points. (Sixty entries means 30 points to 1st place, 29 point to 2nd place, 28 points to 3rd place, etc.)
3. Participants at the state drama festival receive 30 points for 1st place, 25 points to 2nd, 20 to 3rd, 15 to 4th, 10 to 5th and 5 to 6th.

Changes to Poetry **Located in the Bylaws**

Section B11.3

Selections used in this event must be in poetic form. Selections from drama are not to be used.

Multiple selections may be used, however, the selections must be linked somehow by author and/or theme. The author's words as published in the literature may not be altered for the presentation with the exception that cutting is permitted. Combining or blending selections will not be permitted. Material being performed at the PHSSL tournament must match the student's original script. The selection(s) must have an introduction which must include the title and the author. In the case of multiple selections, the introduction may be delivered at the beginning of all selections or short introductions may be delivered prior to each selection

The intent of PHSSL is that all materials presented in interpretation events must be available to all members of the league. All selections must be published or commercially available in print, audio, or video form. At PHSSL tournaments, contestants must bring the published copies of their selection with an ISBN or ISSN in either print, audio or video form, with title page or audio/video credits included. If the original copy does not have an ISBN or ISSN, the coach or supervising adult must be able to show that the original was purchased or obtained commercially, ie. a bill of sale from a literary agent or publisher, or that the original is publicly available by internet URL and retrieval date.

PLAIN TALK ABOUT STUDENT CONGRESS BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

(Prepared by Peggy Madden and Alice Ursin)

In order to participate in the Student Congress held during the State Tournament, a school (not a student) must submit a bill or resolution by the date listed on the PHSSL Calendar.

Bills and resolutions submitted to PHSSL should be original to your school and not something you found at another student congress.

It is important that bills and resolutions follow the proper format. Hybrids (half bill/half resolution) are not acceptable.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions answer two simple questions:

1. Why do we want to do something?
2. What is it we want to do?

The WHY is expressed through whereas clauses which begin the resolution. If you were to substitute the word "because" in place of "whereas" at the beginning of each clause it would read smoothly, but the language of Parliamentary Procedure requires you use the word "Whereas."

The resolution ends with a statement that begins with "Therefore, be it resolved by this PHSSL State Student Congress here assembled that . . ." and simply explains what it is you wish to do. A resolution may consist of just this statement and not explain why.

Resolutions may suggest change (but you need not indicate how) or may be written to support the status quo, to praise a person or event, to chastise, or to offer a proclamation.

BILLS

Bills answer many questions:

1. What is it we want to do?
2. How will we do it?
3. Who will administer it?
4. When will we start to do it?
5. How will it be financed?
6. How will it be enforced?
 - A. By whom?
 - B. Do we need penalties if people don't comply?
 - C. What will these penalties be?

Bills do not explain why, and so they begin immediately with the clause "Be it enacted by the PHSSL State Student Congress here assembled that . . ." Sections that follow answer the necessary questions listed above. It is not always necessary to answer all of the questions listed nor in the order listed.

Bills do not suggest; they mandate change, and if enacted (passed), have the power of law.

The CONGRESS WORKSHEET on the following three pages should help you in preparing a good bill or resolution for the PHSSL State Student Congress.

WORKSHEET FOR PREPARING
CONGRESS BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

So.....you want to write a bill. DECIDE, is it something that you want to be definite and have the force of law OR are you merely stating a conviction and saying "Wouldn't it be nice if....?"

HOW TO BEGIN:

LOOK AROUND YOU, READ AND WATCH THE NEWS. Is something troubling you about our society, our foreign policy, our morals, etc. THEN:

I. STATE THE PROBLEM: _____

II. WHY IS THERE A PROBLEM? ARE THERE ANY CONTRIBUTING FACTORS? WHAT'S HAPPENING?

III. WHAT CAN BE DONE ABOUT IT? ARE THERE PENALTIES IF THE LAW IS VIOLATED? IF FINANCING IS NEEDED, HOW WILL IT BE DONE? WHEN WILL THE LAW TAKE EFFECT?

NOW YOU'RE READY TO BEGIN

First write a resolution. Begin with WHEREAS clauses. Whereas clauses are where you build your rationale. Use Parts I and II to help you. Conclude with BE IT RESOLVED...using Part III.
