At the June meeting of the Executive Board many actions were adopted that affect PHSSL's operation. Let me provide you with "headlines." Changes in the Bylaws or Handbooks will be updated on the on-line version and available as soon as possible for your convenience. If you do not have access to the internet, please feel free to request paper copies from the State Office.

- Election results for the four annual Executive Board position are as follows: Chris
 Berdnik, Bob Hall, Nathan Lawver, and Mike Shaffer. Also, I want to thank all those
 individuals who showed interest in becoming a Board member by having their names
 placed on the ballot.
- 2. Paypal will now be accepted for Membership fees as well as paying for tournament fees & tournament meals. Email Jodi if you wish to use this method. (jfettero@bloomu.edu)
- 3. We will be implementing e-Balloting for all events this year.
- **4.** Newsbroadcasting format has been changed to the following: Round 1 International News, Round 2 Lighter side, Quarters Site, Semi's Domestic, and Finals Choice of script previously used. Also, a motion was passed to make sure all participants are seated during competition. The online Handbook will be updated.
- **5.** Presiding Officer awards, the All State Cast Award, and the District award are all eliminated.
- **6.** Singing is allowed in Duo up to 30 seconds as long as it is original. This will be added to the ByLaws.

- 7. Meals for the State Tournament are going to be ordered the same as last year, through the State Secretary. All orders will need to be placed and paid for by a certain date. Payments will be accepted by check, cash, or PayPal. Tickets for meals will be picked up at the registration table at check in.
- **8.** After a survey of the new "No Blended Poetry" Policy, the board has reviewed the results. Blended poetry will now be allowed with clear distinctions being made as to which poem is being performed. The rules are similar to the NCFL. The ByLaws will be changed to reflect this. Thank you to everyone who participated in the survey.
- **9.** Changes have been made to the Drama Festivals. Please see Page # for more information on the updates.
- **10.** Please be sure to forward information to the State Office regarding any PHSSL competition you have scheduled, so we can place it on the Events Calendar.
- 11. Hall of Fame Coordinators: Mr. David Long Please send your nominations to him no later than December 1.

PENNSYLVANIA HIGH SCHOOL SPEECH LEAGUE EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING – June 27, 2018

CALL TO ORDER:

The Executive Board of the Pennsylvania High School Speech League was called to order at 9:15 am, on Wednesday, June 27, in Kehr Union, Multicultural Center, at Bloomsburg University with the following members present: Michael Shaffer, Jeff Byko, Beth Young, Bob Hall, Barb Giuliano, Chris Berdnik, Phil Burrell, Dave Long, Kate O'Halloran, Neil Strine, Executive Director, and Jodi Fetterolf, Secretary. Mr. Strine welcomed the new members of the Executive Board: Chris Berdnik, Bob Hall, & Mike Shaffer. Nathan Lawver was absent. Additions to the Agenda were made including adding discussion on co-champions, get names for Policy Debate Winners listed in the Program, Topics, and discussion about Bloomsburg University and PHSSL relationship. Mike Shaffer motioned to approve the agenda, Beth Young seconded and the Agenda was approved.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Neil Strine asked the board to review the minutes from the March Executive Board Meeting. Chris Berdnik made a *motion to approve the March Executive Board minutes*. Barb Giuliano seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously approved.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT:

Neil Strine announced the tournament dates for the 2018- 2019 Drama Festival (January 4 & 5, 2019) and State Tournament (March 15 & 16, 2019). We will be using Carver Hall again for the Drama Festival.

Neil Strine announced that 34 schools voted in the Board Member election this year.

Neil Strine announced that there was an issue with QuickBooks for PHSSL. A financial report will be emailed by late summer.

Administrative

- 1. Mr. Strine asked all Executive Board members to review the following handouts and information for the 2018-2019 school year: (information found on handouts are bolded)
 - Minor corrections were reviewed regarding the **PHSSL brochure**, updates and additions will be given to Jodi. The brochure will be sent to both previous and non-member schools within the Commonwealth along with an invitation to join PHSSL during the 2018-2019 school year.
 - The **2018-2019 calendar** was reviewed. Additions will be added on, and it will be posted on the website and each *Communicator* edition that is published. District tournaments must be held by Feb 23 (special circumstances will be considered) District Reports by February 27. Also, adding to calendar that March 12 is the last date to make all changes in Tabroom for state tournament.

- **District Board assignments** were discussed and recorded. They will be posted in the communicator.
- **Regional Drama Festival Chair assignments** for 2018-2019 were discussed. All coordinators remain the same.
- Mr. Long will continue the duties of Hall of Fame Coordinators. The September *Communicator* will have a Hall of Fame nomination form enclosed and all persons interested in nominating someone for the Hall of Fame will need to complete the form and send it to Mr. Long by December 1. Rules and regulations for nominating someone to the Hall of Fame are in the Bylaws. A reminder that people do not roll over. It is a clean slate for new nominations.
- A handout was given of all the contact information that is on file for Hall of Fame winners. If there are errors or missing information that you know of, please give to Jodi. Ballots are sent to those that Jodi has current information for including physical addresses and or emails. If you are not receiving a ballot and should, contact Jodi with updated info: jfettero@bloomu.edu
- We will open up the option to use PayPal for Paying for memberships. PayPal use went well for meals tickets.
- Traveling Trophy will be updated and future winners will be responsible for their name plaque.
- PHSSL & PSDA
 - o Formal paperwork needs to be completed and a board approval is needed.
 - o Dues would increase by \$5 and be forwarded to PSDA.
 - o Advertising and the increase in membership for PSDA. Act 48 credits for PHSSL Members. PSDA would help with food for judges and Tabroom at state tournament.
 - o Neil will discuss with Vicky Trimmer about the legal issues and what will be required.
 - o Chris Berdnik motioned to have a memorandum of understanding where PHSSL agrees to collected \$5 from each school each year in return PSDA will provide membership to each school for the head coach for one year. Agreement for one year, subject to renewal after one year. Barb Giuliano seconded. All in favor and the motion passed.
 - O Dave Long motioned to increase the membership dues by \$5 pending the memorandum being passed. Mike Shaffer seconded. All in favor and the motion passed.
- Bloomsburg University and PHSSL
 - o Recruiting opportunities for BU. The University is requesting that we get contact information from students participating including name, email, and year of graduation.
 - O Discussion was held. No information will be provided to PHSSL from the High Schools. Voluntary information can come from students. Names of students and school addresses can be provided. A table can be set up near the snack bar or registration from the University to collect information.

General Business

1. Tournament Logistics

- a. Judges lounge was crowded will be moved to the Student Services Center
- b. Snack bar will be moved to the Student Services Center downstairs or to Centennial Hall Lobby.
- c. Descriptions of the awards will be put in the program.
- d. Dinner for the judge's lounge and Tabroom will be moved to 5pm-8:30pm and cut back on the ordered for Friday.
- e. Building Signs were very good. One central ballot collection will be in Student Service Center, which is closer to everything.
- f. T-Shirts ran small, order one extra size up.
- g. Length of awards ran long. Start Welcome earlier and do awards in order of which are finished first.

h. Hall of Fame will be moved back to the Opening assembly.

2. News Broadcasting Issues

- d. Ben Edwards seconded, all in favor and the motion passed. Beth Young will revise and send to Jodi.
- e. Confusion on picking up ballots but was fixed on the first day.
- f. A new place for having News Broadcasting meeting because the Auditorium was too loud.
- g. No place in the handbook does it say participants need to be seated. Motion to add while seated was given by Jeff Byko. Dave Long Seconded, all in favor and the motion passed. Beth Young will also make the changes.

3. Congress Issues

- a. Rooms other than auditorium for Congress were discussed.
 - i. Tables can be utilized instead and one table will be added to the Senate room.
- **b.** Confusion over time. The new Handbook is correct.
- **c.** Calendar confusion. Once the calendar is set by random draw there are no changes.
 - i. A discussion was held.
 - ii. Beth Young will update handbook change to state 2/3rd to make change.
- **d.** Interruptions in Congress Mostly senate.
- e. Alternate scoring. Everyone ranks but on a score sheet it alternates.
- **f.** Senate and House handbooks should be combined.
- **g.** A comment was made about checking the tie breaker in Supersession board was unsure what this meant.
- **h.** Check the number of Chambers after drop not changing the number of people.
- i. Drop presiding officer awards
 - **i.** A discussion was held.
 - **ii.** Beth Young Motioned to drop presiding officer awards in both House and Senate. Chris Berdnik seconded. Kate O'Halloran and Dave Long were against. All other in favor. Motion passed.
 - **iii.** Presiding officer awards will not be given. Changes to B20.6 in handbook will be updated.
- **j.** Increase time for Congress students to eat lunch.

4. Policy Debate schedule and mini judges lounge

- **a.** Judges Lounge in Old Science & food to be held in Art Department Lobby 3rd Floor Room 210.
- **b.** Change Policy Round 2 from 12:30pm to 1:30pm

5. Potential merge for Tab Functions around LD, PFD, and Parli Debate.

- a. Open debate judge pool idea with strikes against what they can't judge.
- **b.** Remove part of the rules referring to Speech judges being required to Judge Public Forum
 - i. Eliminating best judges too soon, keeping gender and geographical balances.
 - ii. Discussion was held.

- **iii.** Chris Berdnik motioned to merge tab functions of PF, LD, Parli, and Policy Debate for purpose of pooling qualified judges across events. Ben Edwards seconded. Kate O'Halloran abstained. Motion passed.
- **iv.** Ben Edwards motioned to eliminate in the Bylaws section B4.5 "All Speech judges are eligible to be assigned to judge Public Forum debates." Christ Berdnik seconded. Kate O'Halloran, Phil Burrell, and Jeff Byko opposed. Motion was passed. Double check procedure for District and State. Check State standing rules.

6. Singing in Duo was brought up by Cory Shay – Do we have a specific time?

i. Discussion held. Dave Long motioned to allow singing for up to 30 second as long as it is original and add it to Duo B10.5. Jeff Byko seconded, all in favor and the motion passed.

7. Change to Online Balloting – Change all events.

- a. Discussion was held.
- b. Debate has already started with online balloting. Laptops or tables should be used. Only ranking are needed right away. Judges have 24 hours to put in comments.
 - i. Beth Young motioned to use all online balloting for all events for 2019. Jeff Byko seconded. Motion was passed.
 - ii. A PDF will be send out to all membership schools.
 - iii. Will try to find more rooms with computers for judges.
 - iv. YouTube video from Phil will be posted on Webpage and sent out to schools.
 - v. Minimum words for comment sections will be tried at other tournaments before states.
 - vi. Entries/Checks in Tabroom Less people. Assign people to look through comments to make sure they are there.
 - vii. Expectations for comments by 8am Saturday for Prelims and by 2:30pm on Saturday for all others.
 - viii. Print on Card Stock Pro Con tents for PF and Parli (70 quantity)

8. Debate Speaker Points

- a. Discussion was held and Handout provided.
 - i. Comments should be specific to individuals, but points will be team points not individual speaker points.
- b. Discussion held on scale in handout.
 - i. Decimals or whole numbers?
 - 1. Chris Berdnik motioned to use the scale provided by Michael McCabe in the handout with decimals and descriptors mentioned. Motion not passed.
 - 2. Chris Berdnik motioned to use scale with whole numbers 30-23 with descriptors mentioned. Barb Giuliano seconded, motion passed.
 - 3. Scale will be added to E-Ballots.

9. Awards for Debate Quarters should be plaques.

- a. Discussion held
- b. Ben Edwards motioned that top 8 get plaques at the state tournament for Debate events including Parli, PF, Policy and LD. Chris Berdnik seconded motion passed.

10. Survey to change qualifying process & Eliminate District Awards and create divisions.

- a. Proposals:
 - i. Each school attending gets to bring one extra student in any event.
 - 1. Could be individual or team event.
 - 2. Discussion held

- ii. Underclassmen advancing to semi-finals or finals (or quarters in debate) auto qualify for the following year.
 - 1. Discussion held.
- iii. District awards
 - 1. Eliminate the district award and create divisions
 - 2. Discussion held.
 - 3. Beth Young motioned to create a survey (Ben Edwards & Jeff Byko) to see if there is any way to create more participation at the state tournament. Mike Shaffer seconded. All in Favor and motion passed.
 - 4. Beth Young motioned to create divisional awards at the state tournaments. Mike seconded.
 - a. Suggested that we begin the study of creating divisions.
 - b. Not by school size, but by participation of that state tournament.
 - c. All in favor, and the motion passed.
 - 5. Committee created: Ben Edwards, Mike Shaffer, and Dave Long. Will revisit summer 2019.
 - 6. Ben Edwards motioned to eliminate the District award. Chris Berdnik seconded, 2 members abstained and the motion passed. The District award was eliminated for 2018-2019 school year.

11. Blended poetry survey results.

- a. Discussions of results from survey.
- b. Suggestions were to create a new event. Discussion held.
- c. Suggestion to combine poetry and prose and add poi. Discussion held.
 - i. Chris Berdnik motioned to follow the most popular choice from the survey. Ben Edwards seconded. Motion was passed.
 - ii. The Bylaws will be changed to allow combining poems with clear distinctions being made as to which poem is being performed, following rules similar to the NCFL "If using a series of pieces, all titles and authors must be cited. The performer has the burden to be clear at all times which piece is being used. In the prepared script, the pieces should be clearly delineated via highlighting or font style and spacing to enable review in case of a protest."
 - iii. Rewrite poetry Bylaws B11.3
 - iv. Update Master Ballot

12. Switching debate pairing methods from Hi/Hi to Hi/Lo with Opp Seed.

- a. Discussion was held on handout provided by Ben Edwards.
- b. Used for pairing 3 & 4 and seeding 1-8.
- c. Ben Edwards motioned to adopt the Hi/Lo with opp seed for pairing and tie breaking in all debate events. Jeff Byko seconded and the motion passed.

13. Reconsider Drama Festival – Change time limits on presentations & One Act Plays/Drama Handbook changes.

- a. Proposed changes:
 - i. Schools are allowed to enter 1 as of now for Regionals.
 - 1. Schools will have ability to enter 2 plays for regionals. Students can only be in 1 play and schools must pay for both entries. Mike Shaffer motioned to adopt this. Beth Young Seconded. Motion passed.
 - ii. No musicals currently
 - 1. Change to up to 5 minutes of singing total. Mike Shaffer motioned to adopt this. Beth Young seconded. Motion passed.

iii. Time Limit changes

- Change minimum time to none. Max time is 60 minutes. 30 second over and you cannot place first. This includes set up and strike times. Motioned to adopt by Mike Shaffer, Chris Berdnik seconded. Motion passed.
- iv. Section 18.6: No school should attempt to transport complete state setting.
 - 1. Mike Shaffer motioned to remove this from handbook. Ben Edwards seconded and the motion passed.

v. Tie-Breakers

- 1. Follow Tie Breaker for Interpretation rules in PHSSL. Mike Shaffer Motioned to accept, Beth Young Seconded and the motion passed.
- vi. Tech awards given the same as All State Cast awards.
 - 1. Mike Shaffer motioned to create the All State Crew award based on school, Dave long seconded and the motion passed.
- vii. Motion to eliminate All State Cast and All state Crew awards to be more in line with PHSSL events by Chris Berdnik. The motion was seconded by Beth Young. Motion Passed. The All State Cast Award was eliminated and the All State Crew Award will not be created.
- viii. Mike Shaffer motioned to announce the top 3 place winners at the State Tournament instead of at the Festival in January. Beth Young seconded and the motion was passed.

14. Co-Champions

- a. Discussion was held.
- b. Motion to offer the possibility of co-champions in debate events by Beth Young. Ben Edwards seconded and the motion was denied.

15. Policy Debate Winner Names in Program

a. Jodi will start researching to add to the program for next year.

16. **Topics:**

a. Topics for Parliamentary Commentary and Extemp were chosen. Will be released on March 1, 2019.

With no further business, Jeff Byko made a motion to adjourn the Summer Executive Board meeting. The motion was seconded by Beth Young, unanimously passed and the meeting adjourned.

State Drama Festival Summary of Judging Results

Article B18 – Drama

Section B18.1a

Each school may have two entries in the Regional Drama Festivals. In the case of a single gender school, arrangements may be made with the Regional Drama Coordinator of the event.

Section B18.1b

In cases of multiple entries, each entry must be a different piece and students cannot be casted in more than one entry.

Section B18.1c

Schools will be charged separately for each entry in the Regional and State competition.

Section B18.2

Each region shall qualify two plays to the State Drama Festival. If eight schools participate in any Regional Drama Festival, three plays will advance from that Regional Festival to the State Drama Festival. No more than eight schools shall make up a Regional Festival. If more than 24 schools enter the Regional Festival, a fourth Regional Festival will be created.

Section B18.3

Material used may be a one-act play, a cutting from a longer play, or an original play. Cutting of musicals may be used, but singing cannot exceed a combined time of 5 minutes. The play must have a minimum of three characters. Characters may not be added or cut from published plays that would be in violation of copyright regulations except with written permission by the publisher and/or author. The play which wins first place in the State Tournament may not be used the following year. Each school is responsible for any royalty obligations.

Section B18.4

The playing time shall be not more than 60 minutes total, which includes all setup and strike time. There is no minimum time for an entry.

Section B18.5

A total of 60 minutes will be available to each play for technical rehearsal, including setting the stage, and striking the stage. The time may be used at the discretion of each school, but may not exceed 60 minutes total and may be influence the judge's ranking.

Section B18.6

The host school shall supply a basic lighting plot with a minimum of three general lighting areas and one follow spot. It is suggested that participating schools supply a light, sound, and curtain cue sheet. The host school shall supply a simple set adaptable to the needs of the plays. All hand properties, make-up, and costumes shall be provided by the school presenting the play.

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Section B18.7

Any play that is more than one minute under the minimum or one minute over the maximum in extra playing or technical time is not eligible to receive first place on any individual judge's ballot. This will not affect the selection to the All-State Cast.

Section B18.8

- a. The regional and state judging shall be the ranking system as used in all Pennsylvania High School Speech League events.
- b. The judges are to be selected by the Regional Coordinators for regional competition, and by the Executive Director for State competition. A panel of three judges must be used at the Regional competition. Regional judges will be paid \$10.00 per play. A panel of five judges must be used at the State competition.
- c. Tiebreakers for Regional and State Drama Competition shall reflect the tiebreakers for the interpretation events at the State competition (Example Judges preference Reciprocals).

Section B18.9

The Director of the contest play will not be allowed backstage during setup, performance, and strike. The Director is permitted in the dressing rooms.

Section B18.10a

Awards at the State Festival: the top three pieces receive plaques (Example: first place, second place, and third place); the remaining schools receive "State Finalist" plaques.

Section B18.10b

Competing schools at State competition will be notified if they are "State Placing Teams" or "State Finalists". All Ranks and Awards will be announced and the all teams will be recognized at the Spring PHSSL State Competition during the Awards Ceremony.

Section B18.11

Regional Registration will now be sent to the State Office, and after all registrations are received, individual schools will be assigned to a regional competition. Geographic location and equalization of regional competition will be the prime factors in assigning schools. There will be three regions. No more than eight schools can be assigned to a region. If needed, additional region(s) will be created. The registration fee for the regional drama festival shall not exceed \$50.00.

Section B18.12

All schools participating in Regional Drama will receive 4 points for participation. All schools participating in State Drama will receive 4 points for participation.

Section B18.13

The Drama Handbook shall be considered a part of the Constitution.

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Festival and Contest Suggestions

The Regional Drama Coordinator will schedule its Drama Festival whenever it is convenient for that particular Region, and at any time prior to the deadline set by the League Office. Each member school is permitted to enter one or two plays in a Regional Festival. Each Region shall qualify two plays to the State Festival. Where possible, area colleges might be willing to help with the Regional Festival in providing facilities and judges. A member of the Executive Board will be appointed as liaison to each of the Regional Drama Festivals.

The following suggestions are given for the Regional Coordinator and host schools in planning for the Regional, and State Festival.

- 1. The Regional Drama Coordinator must be active in secondary school drama and/or knowledgeable in drama.
- 2. All deadline dates for the Regional and State Festivals will be enforced.
- 3. The schedule for the performances of the plays can be by an impartial drawing for position; or the plays may be scheduled to facilitate staging and timing by the Regional Coordinator (Regional) and the Executive Director (State).
- 4. The host school or Coordinator will provide a competent stage crew. The participating school may provide its own trained stage crew, if acceptable with host and the school's regulations.
- 5. The host school shall provide competent light and sound technicians who will receive cues from the competing high school student stage managers.
- 6. The host shall provide a timekeeper and such house personnel as necessary to insure a smooth running performance.
- 7. The Coordinator will be responsible for sending all necessary information and reports to the Executive Director immediately at the close of the event.

It is the responsibility of the Coordinator in charge to secure competent judges. JQP's must be completed for the Drama judges for all levels of competition. The judging will be by a panel of judges. Regional judges will be paid \$10.00 per play. The following committees can function to arrange for the planning and presentations of Drama events:

Regional Festival: Director of the host school, Regional Coordinator as appointed by the

Executive Director, and Chairperson of the participating districts

State Festival: Executive Director, Executive Committee, and the Regional Directors

4.	<u>Direction</u> – Were the roles appropriately cast? Was the theme or main idea of the play brought out? Was there evidence of effectiveness of the director's influence over mechanics of stage business, balance, proportion, emphasis, placing, grouping, and movement of the players on stage and in creation of mood? Were the time limits observed?
5.	<u>Tempo</u> – Was the pace in keeping with the general idea of the play? Was there smoothness, variety, and appropriateness in the movement of the play?

Synopsis of Problem Areas and Resolutions for 2019-2020

PROBLEM AREA I: ARMS SALES

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially reduce Direct Commercial Sales and/or Foreign Military Sales of arms from the United States.

In the movie *Iron Man*, upon his triumphant return to the United States, arms dealer Tony Stark reflects upon the world his products helped shape:

"I saw young Americans killed by the very weapons I created to defend them and protect them. And I saw that I had become part of a system that is comfortable with zero-accountability...I had my eyes opened. I came to realize that I had more to offer this world than just making things that blow up. And that is why, effective immediately, I am shutting down the weapons manufacturing division of Stark Industries."

Just as Tony Stark faced his day of reckoning, the United States is on the verge of facing a similar fate. President Trump is actively increasing the number of arms contracts offered and authorized by the United States. One must ask whether arms sales make us safer and strengthen our economy, or create blowback which increases terrorism or fuels conflicts in a variety of regions across the globe. Direct Commercial Sales affirmatives would limit the number or type of sales by American companies to foreign militaries. These affirmatives could prohibit the sale of drone technology, reduce small arms sold to nations like Saudi Arabia which are used to perpetrate human rights abuses, or strengthen export controls to prevent future resale of our technology. Foreign Military Sales affirmatives would reduce sales by the Departments of State or Defense to foreign militaries. These affirmatives could prohibit sales of F-35s to Israel which are used for bombing raids, prevent Japanese acquisition of Tomahawk missiles which would provoke China or North Korea, or prevent sales to Qatar which may give US munitions to terrorist organizations. Affirmatives addressing either type of sales could net advantages such as: Terrorism, proliferation, human rights credibility, hegemony, and increasing stability in the world's most volatile regions. Negative teams will have access to alliancebased disadvantages highlighting the need for arms sales to create commonly equipped militaries, defending arms sales as a credible deterrent to prevent conflicts, acknowledging the economic impact of reducing the role of one of the largest economic sectors, or arguing countries like Russia or China would fill in and negate solvency. The only constant element of President Trump's foreign policy is to increase arms sold by the United States, which makes the literature base broad and accessible, we have not embraced the opportunity to debate arms sales since 1983, and the time to rekindle this debate is now.

PROBLEM AREA II: INDIA

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its development and/or military assistance to the Republic of India.

India has the second largest population in the world yet has never been the primary focus of a policy debate resolution. India is a country on the cusp of becoming a global power, but is held back by its growing population and regional competitors. India's densely packed urban populations face environmental problems, and resource distribution challenges the nation. The rural areas struggle with poverty, famine, and lack of access to education, health care, and the internet. While gaining military strength, India faces many challenges: terrorist groups, sabre rattling with Pakistan,

competition with China, and cybersecurity. Development and/or military assistance could ameliorate these problems by increasing poverty aid, sharing clean energy expertise, expanding access to health care services, engaging in joint military training exercises, or sharing counter-terrorism intelligence. Negative counterplan strategies could include alternative modes of financing and disadvantages to the topic mechanism (Dutch Disease, Rent-Seeking). Military assistance would provide support to India but also creates negative ground about encroaching on spheres of influence and the consequences of international military engagements. Prime Minister Modi seems willing to work with President Trump, but it is yet to be seen how America will approach the relationship. Affirmatives would be forced to clash with the current foreign policy ideology of "America First", which magnifies links to disadvantages about political flip-flops. Additionally, India's government must decide whether to deal with a controversial Trump administration ahead of their own important elections. Critical arguments about the efficacy of development assistance create important debates regarding America's role in the world, and how we should approach international engagement. Military assistance creates debates over the United States military-industrial-complex that have been a historically rich area of investigation.

PROBLEM AREA III: MIDDLE EAST

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially increase its constructive engagement with one or more of the following: Iran, Saudi Arabia, Syria.

While the Middle East is comprised of a number of countries, it is important that we limit the scope to these three. Saudi Arabia, an ally in name, is participating in the destabilization of Yemen, has had a dubious record regarding terrorism within its borders, and a shameful record on women's rights issues. But a strong relationship with Saudi Arabia may also be the key to peace in the Middle East. Iran seems to be inviting conflict by seeking to expand its sphere of influence: Engagement could bring stability to the region and further the US's goals of helping Iranians, but affirmatives will have to accept working with a government that is openly hostile to US power. Syria is in the midst of a civil war that threatens great power conflict. Previous regimes have chosen to work with local opposition groups rather than Al Assad's government and the current regime seems to have no clear policy regarding how it wants to engage with this critical nation. Affirmatives can argue that stabilizing Syria is key to stopping the refugee crisis, human rights abuses, and ISIS. While engaging these nations may solve major issues, there are plenty of detractors from working with these three nations. From Bashar Al Assaad's human rights violations, Iran's hegemonic encroachment in the Middle East and Saudi Arabia's tendency to overlook terrorism within its borders, these nations offer excellent case debate about whether to engage or shun. Possible affirmative cases include: protecting women's rights in one or more of the countries, pursuing diplomatic solutions to conflicts, or attempting to engage economically. Negative can focus on the problems associated with the United States attempting to help countries in the Middle East. Negatives also have a wealth of process CPs, relations DAs, and kritikal arguments to challenge the standing of any affirmative. This topic would give novice debaters the ability to correct misconceptions about the region while also giving them the opportunity to learn the activity on an easily accessible topic. While we have debated these countries as impact scenarios on other resolutions, we haven't approached this region as a topic area.

PROBLEM AREA IV: NUCLEAR STRATEGY

Resolved: The United States federal government should substantially change its nuclear weapons strategy.

The debate over America's nuclear weapons strategy is essential to our military and diplomatic relations throughout the world. This topic engages debaters on the timely question of: What should our nuclear weapons strategy be? President Trump expresses a strong preference for relying more heavily on the nuclear elements of our deterrent posture. His administration wastes no time in issuing a new Nuclear Posture Review that radically differs from his predecessors. Media coverage of Iran, North Korea, and other countries showcase the wide interests and fears in a changing nuclear climate.

On the affirmative, debaters will find a variety of cases ranging from negotiating international nuclear arms control, declaring no first use, reducing the U.S. arsenal, reducing U.S. alert status, clarifying deterrence posture regarding non-nuclear attacks, clarifying U.S. deterrence/use posture in different regions such as Asia or the Middle East, or increasing U.S. commitment to nuclear treaties. "Change" is a word that has been absent from policy resolutions for over 20 years mostly because of the possibility of creating unlimited, bidirectional topics. The relative narrowness of the content area of this topic, focused on an established nuclear posture review, limits the affirmative to changing course from the existing strategy.

On the negative, debaters will find a variety of strategies from which to engage the affirmative and will enjoy core topic arguments that cover all facets of the topic. Specific disadvantages like deterrence and allied proliferation will cover every affirmative regardless of their direction and create vibrant link debates based on the literature on both sides. Specific counterplans would include consultation, condition/quid pro quo, doing a smaller change than the affirmative, excluding components of the strategy change, creating exceptions to the change, actions unrelated to changing the existing nuclear strategy, and taking actions outside the normal means. Specific critical arguments surrounding international relations, the evolution of nuclear weapons (testing, exclusion, securitization, etc.) and other critical approaches will provide plenty of negative approaches.

PROBLEM AREA V: TREATIES

Resolved: The United States federal government should ratify or accede to, and implement, one or more of the following: Paris Agreement under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court, Trans-Pacific Partnership, United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea.

In June 2018, the United States withdrew from the United Nations Human Rights Council to join Eritrea, Iran, and North Korea as the only nations who no longer participate in any of its meetings. This action reduced the credibility of the United States as an arbiter of international law. Since 1995, the US has ratified only ten treaties. Ratification of one or more of the treaties in this topic is widely regarded as a prerequisite towards regaining its standing as a defender of international law. Affirmatives on the topic could advocate unconditional ratification of any of the listed treaties or could alternatively advocate ratification with reservations excepting individual provisions. Paris Agreement affirmatives will focus on how the United States can address climate change at the national level. Implementation of the Paris Agreement could include affirmatives which focus on renewable portfolio standards, carbon taxes, cap-and-trade systems or favorable frameworks to


increase alternative energy development. Rome Statute affirmatives could focus on why the US should assist in choosing judges and prosecutors, how the ICC could limit drone strikes or other forms of unilateral military action, or how US adherence to the ICC will effectively fight human rights violations. Trans-Pacific Partnership affirmatives could focus on the necessity of the Asia-Pivot strategy, the benefits of free trade on agriculture and alliances, and the US economy. Finally, Law of the Sea affirmatives could focus on the benefits of freedom of navigation, security in the arctic, piracy, or conservation of our oceans. While there are only four treaties included in the topic, there are multiple ways to ratify (or accede to) and implement each one. Those options broaden what might seem a narrow topic. Affirmative cases could leverage the advantages specific to each treaty, and also hold critical and policy-based objections to American exceptionalism and unilateral action. A focused list of treaties allows negatives to develop a variety of strategies against each one to allow rigorous case debates. Counterplan options could include alternate actors and solvency mechanisms as well as reservations against particular provisions of the treaty. There is rich disadvantage ground in the areas of international relations, economic and political leadership, environmental impacts, and human rights. Critical positions arise from issues of American imperialism, exporting capitalist values, flaws in international law and securitization of the environment.

The policy must show that the organization or group is insured for \$1,000,000 total (per incident) for bodily injury and property damage liability during the time in which the facilities are being utilized.

A confirmation of participants or facilities cannot be provided until the Certificate of Insurance is approved by the University.

The Certificate is needed for either or both of the state championships in Drama (December/January) and Forensics (March/April).
